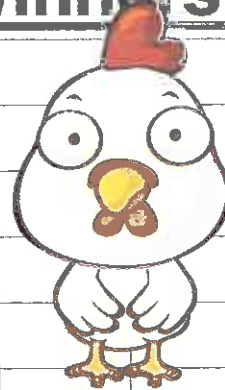

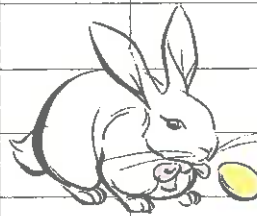

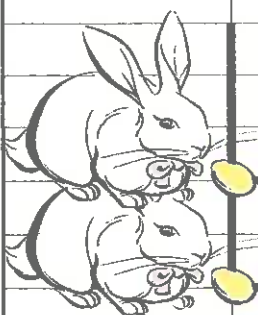

# A Heart of Gold

Most children tend to regard anyone over the age of thirty as old, and certainly to me, as a child, Cliffie appeared quite elderly. I have no idea how old she would have been at that time, but nonetheless she was a pretty little woman with large expressive eyes and silken white hair drawn smoothly up into a tight bun on the top of her head. Probably what attracted me most about her clean and neat appearance was the fact that she always wore a black velvet band around her neck. It seemed so right for her somehow, but I could never make up my mind whether she was dressing in a fashion from the past or being ultra modern. Whatever the reason, the style certainly suited Cliffie. She was a moist friendly little person, but had difficulty in remembering names and, in consequences, found it easy to address one and all as "little dearie". "Thank you, little dearie," she would say to the hugely built and somewhat fierce-looking traffic cop, as he held up his hand for her to cross, and he would respond with a beaming smile, for he loved the sight of Cliffie—everyone did. I once asked her where she had met her husband, Alfred and she had answered that they had first caught sight of each other at a village dance. "He rode me home on the cross-bar of his bicycle. It was so romantic. Every time he kissed the nape of my neck, he rang the bicycle bell," she said. She giggled a little at the thought of it. Cliffie was very proud of Alfred.

“Alfred, my husband, is an artist, you know,” she would say. “Just you wait, little dearie, one day his paintings will hang in the Royal Academy.”

Yes indeed, Alfred was an artist. Day after day he sat at his easel in the dark little scullery at the back of their home. Blissful and lost in the joy of his art, he seemed totally unaware or unconcerned that Cliffee cleaned and scrubbed other people’s houses to make enough money for their survival. It was Cliffee, too who brought all Alfred’s brushes and paints—oils, expensive in those days—and it was Cliffee who attempted to sell the finished work, though she was never very successful. Alfred’s Paintings were always of a cottage garden. In the foreground, a lady drew water from a well. The garden was so packed with flowers that any gardener would have been green with envy—except, of course, that Alfred had little knowledge of what grew when. So for him any bright flower would do. There was another aspect of Alfred’s paintings that had me puzzled. It was the lady at the well drawing water. There she was in every painting. On her head was the most elegant bonnet—and her long billowing gown certainly looked upper-class to me. But, if she was upper-class, why was she drawing water from the well, and if she did that with regularity, why was she carrying the bucket with arms outstretched? She would have had the biceps of a prize-fighter! Long did I ponder over Alfred’s works of art, and in doing so I acquired the approval of Cliffee who, thinking that I was lost in admiration was happy for me to visit as often as I pleased. Each day before

leaving for work, Cliffee left Alfred and walked to where the main road ran through the small town. It was here that she stood and waited for Joey Merivale.

The Merivales lived in the poorer part of the town, in Summertime Road. Whoever had given it that sunshiney name must have had high hopes, for anything less like summer was hard to imagine. Ill-kept houses leaned dejectedly against one another, their dirty windows and badly drawn curtains giving the effect of hooded eyes. It was one of these houses that Joey Merivale, naught but a child himself, struggled to provide for his two older gangling brothers. Joey's mother had died when he was really small and his father, devastated I suppose by his young wife's death, sought to drown his sorrows and eliminate his wages in the pub on Saturday nights. Joey ran errands and did small gardening jobs in an effort to keep [the family going, and it was he who fought his older brothers' battles and defended them against any ridicule and bullying. In all winds and weathers Joey ran to school. Wearing just a thin and faded cotton shirt and ragged shorts, he gritted his teeth against the elements. His young face already rugged in appearance, his eyes blue and deep-set beneath a shock of thick blond hair. In all winds and weathers, too, Cliffee stood weighting for Joey and handed him a small packet of sandwiches as he passed by. "Thanks, Mrs Cliffee," he would say, knowing, as she did, that those sandwiches would probably be his only food for the day. Well of cause, all that was a very long time ago and the Merivale

boys grew up, prevented, however, from any chance of permanent jobs by Hitler's advance across Europe. In no time at all, war had been declared and Joey Merivale and his brothers went off to serve their country. I went away, too, and trained as a nurse in one of the London hospitals. Six years of war went by and I received scant news about the people in my home town, but I was saddened to learn that the two older Merivale boys had lost their lives in battle and that only Joey had ultimately returned. Local people shook their heads, saying sadly, "If only the army had kept them all together—Joey would have protected his brothers against the enemy," Throughout the war Alfred had continued with his painting, but the lady at the well drawing water now wore a tin hat and blue overalls. She stood; spade in hand amongst a multitude of vegetables. Cliffee sold a number of paintings to the town council and they were displayed around town. Cliffee's pride in them knew no bounds. She didn't even mind the Dig For Victory Instructions printed beneath. "One day—just you wait and see," she would say.

A few years went by and a longing came over me to return to my old home town again. The exhausted aftermath of war was still apparent and, as I wandered up the street where Cliffee and Alfred had lived, I took a chance and knocked at the door of their old home. To my surprise, Cliffee answered the door, and she greeted me with enthusiasm. "Come in, come in, little dearie," she said. "I'll put the kettle on and we'll have a cup of tea." We edged around Alfred's sitting at his

easel and I stole a glance at his latest artistic creation. It was still the cottage garden full of flowers, but the lady at the well in the past must have had water laid on in her cottage, for now she stood, without the bucket but beneath an archway heavily laden with roses. Neat and clean, and sweet as ever, Cliffee was obviously too old now to be scrubbing and cleaning. Carefully I broached the subject. I wondered if I could provide money for them to buy a few groceries each week? "Oh, no little dearie," Cliffee responded. "Thank you for your kindness, but we have more than enough. "You'll never guess how, "she continued shyly. "Well, I've become a gambler. Each week I go to the market and place two pennies on the Big Spinner arrow and each week, without fail, I win two big bags of groceries—simply everything we need. The man running the spinner calls me Lady Luck. 'Oh, dear, here comes Lady Luck again,' he says" It was curiosity, I suppose, that led me to the market after leaving Cliffee and Alfred I found the Big Spinner, and as I waited to hand over my money to the operator, he suddenly turned towards me and found myself looking into the deep blue eyes and rugged face of an older Joey Merivale, who had never forgotten kindness shown to him by a sweet-faced little old lady.

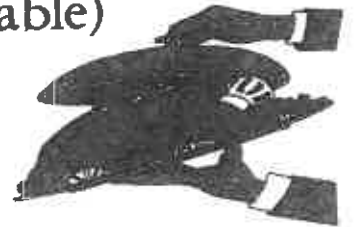

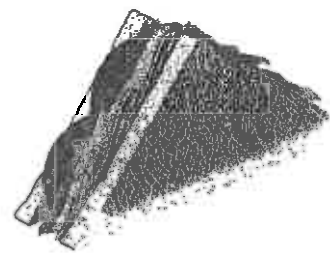

# Well Dressings

Each year we look forward to the wonderful ceremonies of Well Dressing. The Peak District Counties of Derbyshire and Staffordshire are famed for decorating wells. What makes English Well Dressings special is the way the wells are decorated. By using flowers, moss, lichen and seeds, wonderful pictures are created often of biblical scenes but not exclusively. The custom developed from the worship of vital natural recourses such as water and it is believed the Celts, Romans and Saxons all revered rivers and springs. The Church built on these practices especially where springs and wells were thought to have curative properties. The Black Death of 1348-9 decimated many villages but where villages were untouched this was put down to the purity of the wells. It is thought the practice of placing flowers at the well began at Tissington. Usually in Derbyshire the base is a wooden tray or a number of wooden trays that will be held vertically on a frame around the well. These trays are soaked in a local stream for a few days before starting. Then clay is plastered onto the trays. Mostly petals rather than whole flowers are used. These petals are gently pressed into the clay to form the wonderful pictures and designs that are produced. To create the more complex designs may take about twenty people up to seven days to complete.

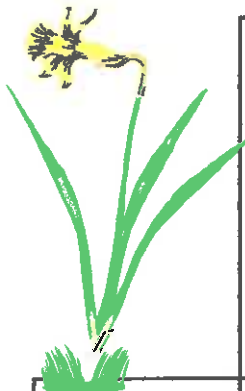
